I consider that the thesis “The emergence of Global Governance as a political revolution. New political paradigms and the shift to postmodern politics (1945-1996)” written by Ms. Marguerite A. Peeters can continue to further stages of the doctoral procedure, according to Polish law. In fact, the thesis -through eight chapters, a conclusion section and five appendices- is a very complete and innovative research in political science and a social science about the emergence of global governance as a political revolution happened within and thorough the UN institution. This research contributes to encourage further investigations in an unfinished topic.

Formally, the thesis is divided into three parts. The first part in two chapters addresses the seminal and gestational phases of the global governance revolutionary process. In search for the seeds and signs of early development of the revolutionary transformation. Part two (in three chapters) exposes the full break-out of the constitution of global governance *as content*. Part three (in three chapters) then analyzes the constitution of global governance *as process*.

The thesis' primary sources are the official UN reports of the main conferences, the UN Charter, the UDHR and a few other major documents of juridical or historical weight, and the report of the independent commissions which had a direct impact of the development of global governance as content and as process.

Finally, this thesis opens further interdisciplinary research lines and constitutes a firm commitment to humanize the policies of international organizations.
